Friday Thought from Di Kitson:

Dear Friends,



Last Sunday saw the church packed out with standing room only for the Remembrance Day service. We were fortunate to have the Vicar of High Wych and Gilston with Eastwick, the Reverend Alison Jackson, presiding at the service. It was indeed a joy to welcome so many people from the town and surrounding areas to our service to commemorate the departed in the many wars that have been fought over the centuries. Pastor Gary Hanson also joined the service and gave a very enlightening talk.

We are now fast approaching Advent as we celebrate the second Sunday before Advent this coming Sunday, a time for reflection and preparation for the fast approaching season of Christmas.

This week we find ourselves reading the final chapter of Mark in this liturgical year. Our story today takes us from the Temple, across the valley to the Mount of Olives. The disciples that are following Jesus can see the Beautiful Gate, according to tradition, the Messiah will come down from the mount and the day of judgement and the dead will be resurrected as he enters the Temple through this gate. Jesus had mentioned before that the temple would be destroyed, and yet less than forty years later it happened. Every stone was thrown down by the Roman armies.

Sometimes, when the news is filled with stories of climate change and polarized thinking spills out into violence and hatred, it feels like all our systems and structures are falling apart. But it is right there, the Kingdom of God is coming together, Jesus is talking about the apocalypse. The word comes from a Greek word that means to uncover or reveal. So one asks ourselves 'what do we need to do to be ready for this event?' The answer is simple, Christ calls us, first of all to be ready, by preparing our own hearts, by paying attention to the presence of God. Christ calls us to walk and talk with others in close fellowship that provides encouragement and accountability. As we join together in Christ, we meet Jesus and keep each other faithful in preparing for his coming. You and I are the people of hope in this world that desperately needs it. We are people that Christ sends out to announce good news.

Not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down.' When he was sitting on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John, and Andrew asked him privately, 'Tell us, when will this be, and what will be the sign that all these things are about to be accomplished?' Then Jesus began to say to them, 'Beware that no one leads you astray. Many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and they will lead many astray. When you hear of wars and rumours of wars, do not be alarmed; this must take place, but the end is still to come. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines. This is but the beginning of the birth pangs.

> Resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury

We have just received the news that the Archbishop of Canterbury has announced his resignation, a decision taken in recognition of the Church's profound responsibility towards those who have suffered abuse.

The Makin Review has laid bare the horrific and lasting impact of the abuse inflicted by John Smyth and the failure of the Church to act with sufficient urgency and care. It is thanks to the courage and resilience of survivors that the full scope of this tragedy has been brought to light. To all those who have come forward, I extend my deepest respect, and I urge anyone who has suffered abuse to report it, so we may listen, learn, and act to protect others.

As the Bishop of St Albans, I am wholly committed to ensuring that our churches are places of welcome, safety, compassion, and accountability. We must continue the work to transform our structures and practices, and we must create an environment in which all feel welcome, secure, and valued.

May we work together in faith so that our Church may truly become a place of welcome, security, and compassion—a place where we are watchful yet caring, trusting yet ready to question. It is our shared responsibility to ensure that all who come to worship may do so in safety and in the knowledge of God's enduring love.

Her father started selling ice cream, while her mother looked after the household. Since the lockdown, her father has been driving an electric auto



Priya was always quiet but sincere and respectful. After her 12th class exams, she volunteered with Shiksha Rath for 6 months. Since October this year, she has been working as a full-time intern with us. She not only helps the smaller children with their studies, but she also recycles the oversized clothes donated to us, by stitching dresses for the younger ones. She is now in her first year of college. Her dream is to do B.Ed, a 2-year professional course (Bachelor of Education) after her graduation to pursue a teaching career.

Even as we celebrate Priya's life and service, we wanted to also let you know that you have been an

integral part of her journey. Without your help and support, she couldn't have come this far.

The foodbank sale last Sunday raised a fantastic £120, thank you for your kind generosity.



YTD the foodbank have fed 5063 individuals, of which 1953 are children. As they approach the busiest period, they are on track to exceed the previous year's number of 9721 individuals fed, which is approximately 800 people per month. Through the foodbank referral scheme c.5 tonnes of food is being given out per month. Thanks to all those involved.
